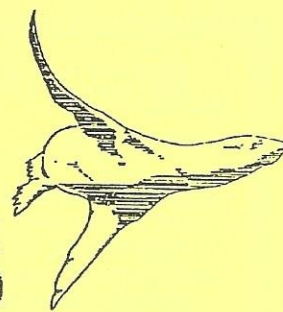




# THE SEA DIVERS

## SPECTACULAR TWO-DAY CRUISE & DIVE

23/24 JULY (Fri/Sat)

BEGG ROCK/SAN NICOLAS/SANTA BARBARA

Our second two-day dive of 1993 is a great southern outer island cruise and dive to the very best spots. This Friday/Saturday affair has all the makings of a really outstanding trip! The rebuilt CHARISMA is berthed at 22nd Street in San Pedro and is 78 feet long, 25 feet wide, has 7 staterooms, a 36-seat galley, freezer, large sun deck, and color TV/VCR. BEGG ROCK is a group of pinnacles which rise about 15 feet above water and then plunge in the most spectacular fashion, to over 100', with rolling ledges from 30' to 60'. The rock is located about 7 miles north of SAN NICOLAS Island, and is noted for its huge plate-sized SCALLOPS on the deeper ledges (easy to limit out at the one-day limit of 10). PHOTOfiles and VIDEO buffs will be well served. Relative beginners should note that BEGG ROCK is fully exposed to the ocean, but on good days may be dived by all skill levels after appropriate pre-dive consultation with The Sea Divers' dive masters and a properly planned dive.

SAN NICOLAS, the outer most of the southern islands, is noted for its relative remoteness and typically large size game. Ocean temperatures are high (50-60 degrees F) like last year, making diving very pleasant. Divers should also have no problem reaching the limit on ABALONE (pinks, greens and/or reds). Large FISH, such as Calico Bass, Sheephead, etc., can be found in the kelp beds and reefs. You won't come home empty handed! We will overnight at SAN NICOLAS, probably at Dutch Harbor, with full dinner, and a modicum of wine, for those interested, socialize with good friends and enjoy a typically great evening, just relaxing. The following day we will either head for BEGG ROCK for our second attempt, or cruise to SANTA BARBARA Island, which is the smallest, prettiest island, and has a little of everything. The spectacular underwater arches, walls, reefs, sea lions, and other sea life are great for PHOTOGRAPHY and VIDEO and visibility is usually exceptional. You should be able to complete your second day ABALONE limit at SANTA BARBARA -- mostly pinks, greens and a smattering of whites and reds. Again, large FISH surround the area, including the occasional black sea bass (these are for viewing only!!!).

In our established two-day tradition, goodies, prizes and/or awards will be featured during this trip. Sign up early to make sure you have a spot on this charter. Bunks will be preassigned on a FIRST PAID basis. Call Kathi (McNally) at (310) 370-1657 for sign up. Boarding begins at 7:00 PM on Thursday, 22 July, and everyone should be on board by 11:00 PM. ### RAIN IN JUNE!? . . . NICE DIVING!!



All but three spots were filled for our June outing on ENCORE to Nine Fathom Reef, San Clemente and Castle Rock. We eased out of the dock at 1:00 AM for a very comfortable, smooth ride to the northwest end of San Clemente arriving at about 6:00 AM in gloomy, heavy mist, overcast and RAIN! About twenty or so divers voted not to dive Nine Fathom due to the anticipated gloom below due to poor early morning light -- probably, as we would see later, a poor decision.

Kenny H eased ENCORE between several reefs immediately east of Castle Rock anchoring in about 50 feet of calm, clear but cool (mid 50's) water. Visibility was at about 50 feet and the area varied from rock piles to sandy areas to small pinnacles. Nice dive, but still on the dark side.

Our second and third dives were again in about 50 feet of water on the tip of Northwest Harbor. A slight current was running, but not significant to the dive. Visibility was over 50 feet and thermoclines were quite noticeable. This is another very pretty spot.

For our fourth and FIFTH dives, we moved over near the wreck of the KOKA which provided similar bottom conditions as dives two and three with the added attraction of a vertical wall for those with adequate bottom time remaining. Visibility was again outstanding -- over 50 feet and there was a noticeable current. It had not warmed up any, however!!

By now the rain had stopped and the clouds were slowly dispersing and as we began our run back to 22nd Street the sun was peaking through. But, as is typical, wind followed the rain, making for an increasingly bumpy and rolly ride home. Most hit their bunks, at least for a while; a few hardy ones HELD ON TO the sun deck most of the way back -- a ride that was not for delicate stomachs or weak arms!!

After rounding the LA Light at about 6:00 PM we gathered in the galley to "honor" the boobie prize candidates: AP for dropping a greasy zucchini stick into his number 18 beer at John T's Tavern; Bob T for boarding CHARISMA instead of ENCORE; Dan P for returning to the boat 25 minutes AFTER everyone else (now known as "Big Ben" Portway), and Rick H for losing AP's spear gun (he retrieved it) and for spearing the world's smallest fish. Rick won -- a \$15 certificate and a soft toy fish to indicate the smallest fish one should seriously consider!! . . . and another fun-filled day ended!



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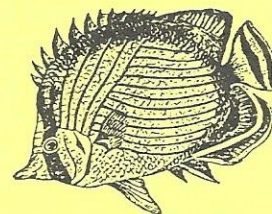
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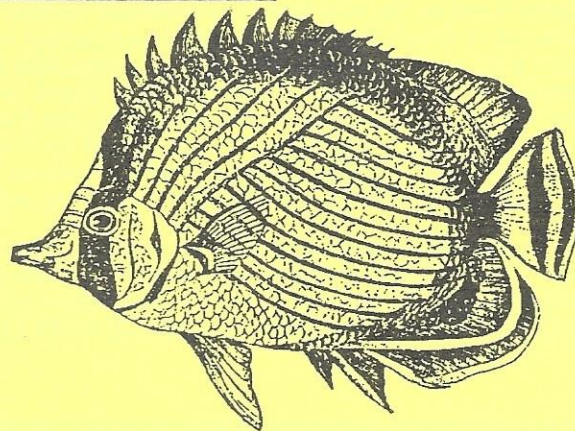
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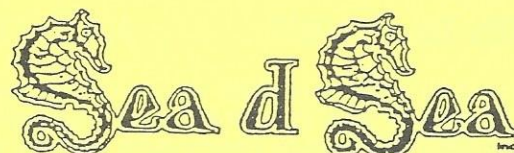

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## BAJA ADVENTURES

Twelve Sea Divers, and coincidentally two Douglas Dive Club members (see "Stan" and Ollie on page 6) made a memorable trip to La Concha Beach Resort, La Paz, Mexico, for an extended Memorial Day weekend. Arrivals varied from Tuesday, 25 May, through Friday, 28 May, and departures Monday, 21 May, through Wednesday, 2 June, eight into La Paz, and four into Los Cabos. Most of us made four days of diving (Friday through Monday) with Fernando Aguilar and his staff.

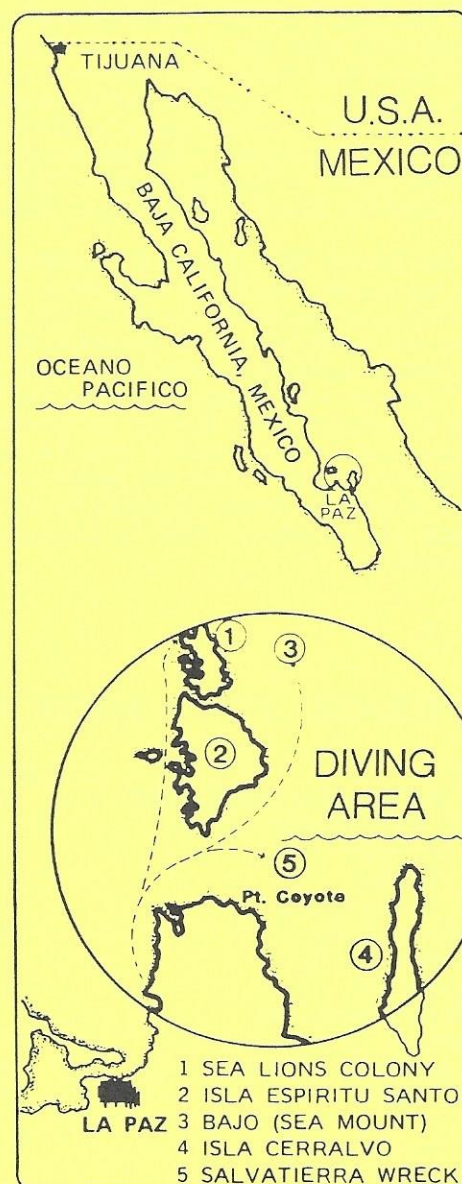
Let's talk diving first! Two tanks per day for four days gave us the opportunity to dive more than the five main spots listed in the Aguilar brochure. Departure was 8:30 AM (approximately) from the beach at La Concha. Civilized!

All dives were non-challenging with calm water except for the Sea Mount (depth) and the second Isla Cerralvo pinnacle dive (depth and current, combined with poor visibility). The Aguilar boats were small, 24' to 31' long, but FAST. With seven to eleven divers, plus two crew on board, it was real easy to develop a pre- or post-dive CF, especially if one or two divers were unconscious of others. The morning dive was usually at about 10:00 AM, followed by lunch, followed by the second dive about 1:00 PM. Arrival back at La Concha beach was typically between 3:00 to 3:30 PM to a cubeta (bucket of ice cold beers -- Pacifico usually) courtesy of Kathi Mc and others. Nice! Most of us thoroughly enjoyed the diving; however, two disappointments were that we did not see the "big stuff" (i.e., hammerheads, manta rays, whale sharks, etc.), and the visibility on several dives was in the 30' range. The August/September timeframe would probably alleviate the two items -- next year maybe to Cabo San Lucas for two or three days then onto La Paz for another two or three days in August/September -- we're in!!

Other than diving!! We definitely had fun -- the group got along well together and we "did" several of the local restaurants and bars "en masse." We spent several significantly happy happy hours at the La Concha poolside bar -- along with the total confusion as to who ordered what -- some never delivered -- and who paid for what and how!! Close enough accounting is apparently a Mexican resort trait -- we also experienced the same approach in Los Cabos. Incidentally, we were VERY impressed with the four or five restaurants where we dined -- El Moro in particular would be fine in London, Paris or Rome -- for Baja, "spectacular"!

La Concha Resort is clean, well maintained, and right on a great beach. At times things seemed to get miscommunicated in the "translations" but typically could be worked out quickly. An amusing example being that Kathy D waited over and over again for a screwdriver from the bar and finished up with a roll-away bed in her single room!? Our only minor complaint was the aforementioned confusion at the poolside bar -- usually, but not always in our favor. Overall it was a great week (or so) of relaxation in the sun, and if you didn't go, you missed a good one. Think about August/September 1994. We are.





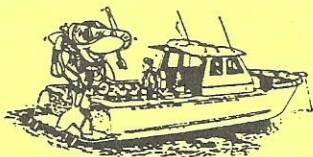
## "STAN" AND OLLIE

Our recent "Baja Adventures" were made all the more interesting and all the more fun with the coincidental trip to La Concha, La Paz, by two infamous members of our companion Douglas Dive Club. Dave G (aka "Stan") and Ollie H met up with The Sea Divers' quiet and shy VP at LAX, much to each other's surprise. We met all three, plus others, in the latter part of Thursday at the La Concha poolside bar. Both DDC members were sampling their third or fourth Bohemia beer -- heavy stuff. Ms. VP was, surprisingly, already a couple of laps behind.

The Sea Divers SCUBA group listened in awe as we realized we were in the company of real life BREATH HOLD spear toters after the BIG stuff -- stealth diving, I believe. They explained that the trip started out with several other DDCites and a boat which degenerated (appropriate word) to "Stan" and Ollie, a skipper and one of the smaller Aguilar boats. As the evening wore on the tales got better and the Bohemia flowed faster -- along, of course with some other Sea Diver concoctions. The 7:30 AM stealth stint the following first dive day was apparently marred by the "morning after" whips and jingles syndrome, but they gallantly soldiered on through a disappointing day. In fact, day after day went by with The Sea Divers representative(s) meeting the "Stan" and Ollie boat to view and photograph the day's big ones and to provide a post-trip Bohemia/Pacifico/Corona. No luck; no big ones; no little ones; no nothing!!! Our disappointment was, I'm sure, second only to theirs, especially as they were spending up to six hours just bobbing around waiting in the environs of Isla Cerralvo.

Excitement struck about the third day. No, it was NOT the 100 pound record-breaker (for the DDCites -- 22 pounds would probably do it for The Sea Divers) hoped for, but a "fisherman's story" and a damn good one at that! It seems that Ollie finally nailed a (the) big one -- wahoo by all accounts -- got him good. Needless to say, Mr. Wahoo was singularly unimpressed and took off with Ollie in tow at a high rate of knots. 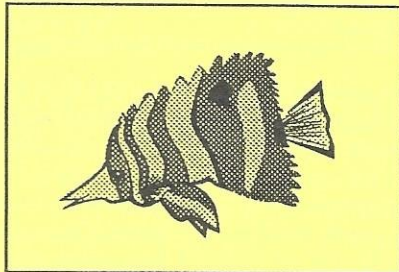

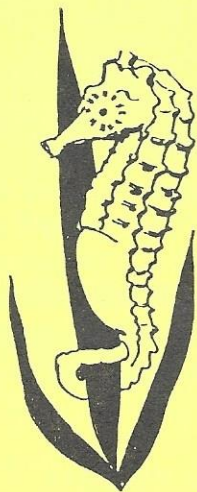
## JUST FIVE YEARS AGO . . .

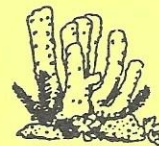

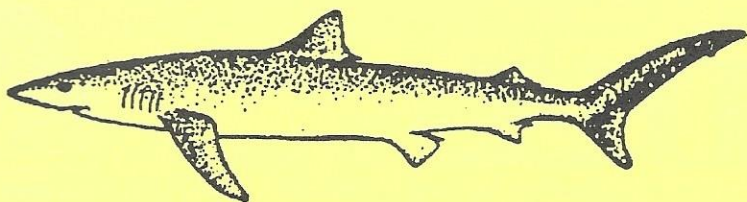

### Wild Wave - Cabrillo Marina

South on Harbor freeway, left on Gaffey, left on 22nd Street, right on Via Cabrillo Marina and follow all the way to the end, turning off the mini-traffic circle onto Whaler's Walk and go to far end of parking lot. Boat is at the end of the walkway at Berth 31.

### Charisma/Encore - 22nd Street Landing

South on Harbor freeway, left on Gaffey, left on 22nd Street, down the hill and park in designated areas.

### Peace - Ventura Marina

North on Ventura freeway to Victoria Ave. in Ventura. Turn left onto Victoria and continue to Olivas Park Drive. Turn right and continue all the way down toward the beach and across Harbor Drive; go to the left on to Spinnaker Drive. Look for Milano's Italian Restaurant and turn right into the parking area. If you get to the end of Spinnaker, turn around and take the second left. Park adjacent to the berth (Slip #20) to unload, then park overnight in the last row adjacent to Spinnaker Drive.

## DIVE BOAT POLICY

A club member may, but is not required to, have a boat deposit on file with the club. A club member may make a reservation on an upcoming dive as follows:

- Unconfirmed reservations may be made for any boat dive at any time. To confirm a reservation, payment in full must be received.
- For single day dives, divers holding an unconfirmed reservation will be called 3 weeks prior to the dive and advised that payment in full is required no later than 15 days prior to the dive to be confirmed. Dive boat deposits will be considered as payment in full.
- For two day dives, divers holding unconfirmed reservations will be called 5 weeks prior to the dive and advised that payment in full is required no later than 30 days prior to the dive to be confirmed. Dive boat deposits may be used as part of the payment in full.
- If payment in full is not received by the deadline, the diver may be replaced by a wait listed diver who has paid in full.

Any reservation may be cancelled two weeks prior to a dive with a full refund. Cancellations will not be accepted within two weeks prior to the dive unless a diver holding a reservation can sell or transfer their reservation to another qualified diver. The dive reservationist will assist in this process, but is not responsible for providing paying alternates. When confirmation is received by the dive boat reservationist that a cancelling diver is being replaced by another qualified diver, the replacement diver is then fully responsible for the cost of the dive.

If a diver has a deposit on file with the club and uses that deposit to secure a reservation on a boat dive, he may not use that deposit to secure additional dives until he has paid the club for the first dive. Two years after a diver has ceased to be a member of the club, his unclaimed dive boat deposit will be forfeited to the club. Only Sea Diver club members and members of other selected clubs may make boat dive reservations prior to one month before a scheduled boat dive. Partial refunds from boats which do not make the advertised dive location will be passed on to members who request them within two weeks of the dive.
