FROM THE EXECUTIVE ARCHIVES...

Digging deep into the Club archives presents and interesting challenge and some fascinating information. In summary below is the Club history:

• 1965 – 1968 The Growing Years

The Club was growing in leaps and bounds. Organization was developed along with the initial Club Charter, Officer Responsibilities, Events Planning and Training Programs.

• 1969 - 1975 The Super-Active Years

The Club averaged 206 members over these years. Activities included the Kelp Restoration Project, the Junior Frogs program, Divemaster Manual, USC Chamber dedication, many Training Programs, move to Lococo's from TRW for General Meetings, a more formal Executive process, new Club logos (1969 & 1974 – the "golfball"), an eleven person Newsletter Publication Staff, and a plan for the future.

• 1976 - 1982 The Stable Years

Membership stabilized around 170. Programs remained as-is throughout the period. The Annual Halloween Costume Party was established as were Eat Ins. Beach diving was "in". Gabby Gastropod was very active, Charter boats included the brand new *Charisma*, *Peace*, *Westerly*, *Blue Sea* and *Truth*. We won "Best Team" award in the 1981 LACC ADP Program.

• 1983 - 1989 The Contentious Years

Diving continued much as before, except that beach diving slowly waned and the "Old Guard" had all but disappeared. Control of the Club became a major issue, two "camps" formed and became significantly polarized. TRW became less "friendly" to SEA (Space Park Employee's Association) Clubs, cutting financial support and increasing bureaucracy. Little did we know that all this was leading to a near collapse for the Club.

• 1990 – 1994 Separation and The Crash

We separated from TRW on 1 January 1990 and became The Sea Divers, a non-profit organization. Membership had started to drop but then plummeted, driven by both a drop in diving generally and the economic issues of the area, including major layoffs especially in the Aerospace industry. The Club was essentially bankrupt in 1992, saved only by a small influx of funds from The First King Harbor Underwater CleanUp. Both 1993 and 1994 were tough years as we continuously failed to fill our boat charters, sometimes by over half! But we survived – barely!

• 1995 – 1999 The Recovery Years

In November 1994 we held and Extraordinary Executive Meeting with the then seven Execs (for fifteen positions!) and key members of the Club. As a result a renewed drive began and the long road to full recovery began. We did eventually have to go to split charters, which many of us abhor. New blood came into the Club and in 1998 we went back to full boat charters with *Great Escape* (a.k.a. *Charisma*) and *Peace*. We have been holding steady at about 125 members with a good core of active, mostly advanced divers, and have our own web page www.seadivers.org.

• 2000 – ? Thirty Five and Over Years

On 10 February 2000 the Club will be 35, with many more diving and fun filled years ahead.....!

In order to get in a relatively early lobster season club dive we are trying this mid-week charter on the *Peace*. Of the four northern channel islands, Talcott Shoals on the northwest end of Santa Rosa Island is the best area for bugs. We've had some successes there on our November / December two-day dives in the past.

Talcott covers a large area and has a myriad of reefs, and ledges that provide good homes to the local lobster. Depths vary from quite shallow to 100 feet or so, typically sloping gradually down from the coastline. The area is open to weather / ocean from the north, so conditions can become uncomfortable to downright nasty. When diveable this is a great area and should yield a number of bugs for the determined.

More World Class diving for us all! Tanner Bank and Cortes Bank, both on one trip!!

Both Banks are near the Mexican border and are typically deep dives, especially Tanner Bank. They are 70 to 80 miles SSW of 22nd Street Landing and about 35 to 40 miles SW of China Point on San Clemente Island and roughly west of San Diego. As exposed dive spots, they are not dived as much as other Southern California areas. Depths at Tanner are 80 to 100 feet plateaus with spectacular drop-offs, Cortes has similar plateaus, but rises to within 20 or 30 feet of the surface in one localized area.

Tanner Bank is known for its large red, pink, and purple hydrocoral formations, large fish, especially rockfish and cabezon. Schools of tuna, yellowtail and other species are not uncommon. This is definitely one of the most spectacular and unusual dives in Southern California. The club has not dived Tanner in many years, so this is your opportunity.

Cortes Bank is closer to the Mexican border and offers additional excellent diving. In addition to the large variety of fish, Cortes is home to a substantial lobster population, many of which can be found inside the wreck of the *Abalonia*. Much less of a plateau than Tanner, it provides a greater variety of walls, crevices, plateaus, and shallower depths.

Photo and video oriented divers will not be disappointed with the dive locations, especially Tanner Bank. Just cruising out there adds to the two days, especially if the sun graces us with it's presence.

This dive is a strong intermediate to advance dive due to the full exposure of both Banks to the ocean. However, relative beginners can make the dives, assuming ocean conditions relative to waves, surge and current are within the individual's capabilities. San Clemente will be our fallback, which is typically suitable for all skill levels. Consult the divemaster if in doubt about your capability verses observed conditions.

These are really outstanding dive areas. Chances to dive here are limited but we've been very successful in the past few years at Cortes. For reservations call Curt (Billings) at (909) 945-3461, Fax at (909) 477-2849 or e-mail curt@diver.net. GREAT DIVING!!



OCTOBER GENERAL MEETING: <u>DALE SHECKLER – CDN EDITOR AND PUBLISHER</u>

Dale Sheckler, Editor and Publisher of California Diving News (CDN) will be our speaker for the October General Meeting. Dale is considered the foremost authority in California diving due to his longtime association with CDN and to the numerous books on California diving that he has co-authored with his wife Kim. In addition to his heavy experience with California Diving News, Dale has had articles and photographs also published in Discover Diving, Rodale's Scuba Diving, Santa Barbara Magazine, Emergency magazine, Totally Kids, Orange County Register, Easy Reader, and The Daily News. Dale is producer of the annual diving Southern California SCUBA Show conventions, the largest expo of its type in the Western U.S. His latest venture is as host of SCUBA Show, Talk Radio for Your

Underwater World? Broadcast Saturday mornings on AM83 KPLS from 6-7 a.m. It is the only radio show of its type in California.

Dale will speak on 'How to Gather Fresh Seafood Underwater in California'. An introduction to his presentation follows:

Nothing delights the palate and belly like truly fresh seafood. California divers are lucky because we have the freshest seafood directly available right in our own backyards! Lobster, crab, clams, abalone, and other shellfish are plentiful and easy to catch if you know where to look, pursue, and gather. And very little extra equipment is needed. This seminar will cover the basics of underwater gathering of fresh seafood in California waters. Discussed will be how to hunt lobster, abalone, scallops, clams, and crabs, as well as unusual, yet tasty varieties, such as urchins and sea snails. An emphasis will be placed on conservation, so gathering can continue for generations to come.

Join us at the next Sea Diver General Meeting for what promises to be an entertaining and interactive presentation by Dale Sheckler. The next Sea Diver General Meeting will be held on Tuesday October 5th starting at 7:00 PM at Round Table Pizza in Hawthorne.

SINK DATE FOR YUKON POSTPONED UNTIL NEXT YEAR

SAN DIEGO -- The scheduled Nov. 13 sinking of a Canadian Naval destroyer, *The Yukon*, off the coast of San Diego, has been postponed until next spring. The announcement was made today by Richard Long, chairman of Project Yukon.

"We have decided that this postponement must be made because of scheduling conflicts in the approval process," said Long. "I want to emphasize that this is a temporary delay in our plans, not a cancellation."

A sink date will be determined by the San Diego Oceans Foundation/Project Yukon, which is coordinating the project. The location of the ship's sinking -- 1.8 miles off Mission Beach in an area designated by divers as "Wreck Alley" – will remain the same.


Due to weather considerations, the sink date must be postponed for up to six months, most probably until May 2000, said Long, a life-long undersea diver and owner of Diving Unlimited International, a San Diego-based diving supply firm specializing in drysuit manufacturing.

Long added: "I realize that our many volunteers and supporters are disappointed. But given the time constraints we faced and perhaps could not have overcome, this is the best decision for the project."

According to Long, current plans call for the *Yukon* to be berthed along the Embarcadero starting in mid-September in cooperation with the San Diego Maritime Museum. Until that time, the ship will be located at the 24th Street Marine Terminal in National City.





February 1968

A GRAND SLAM!

With the Southern California weather this year being somewhat on the weird side, we were not sure what to expect on our Peace two-day to San Miguel Island. The ride out overnight was smooth and just after dawn a trip on deck showed no visible islands, only a relatively calm ocean in heavy fog and overcast. When the boat engines wound down, Richardson's Rock appeared out of the murk. So that was it, calm but heavily overcast, the story for the two days. Great diving, if a little dark down there, but no (nada, zero) sun.

On the first day we dove Richardson's Rock, Castle Rock, both sides and on the second day we dove Boomerang Bank and Wilson Rock. An unusual Grand Slam for San Miguel's major pinnacles. In all, six dives on the first day and four on the second. The Richardson's dive was beset with a very strong surface current and little illumination at depth. Visibility was in the 30 to 40 feet range and temperatures in the high 50's F. This was typical for all the pinnacle dives, except that the current factor occurred only at Richardson's. Scallops were the favorite on the pinnacles, followed closely by vermilion rock fish but the photographers and videographers were definitely not disappointed.

Other dives on the first day were Westcott Shoals, Simington Cove and Cuyler Harbor where we overnighted. After the Boomerang and Wilson dives on the second day we dove Bat Rock, and Middle Rock. Most of the "other dives" had less visibility than the pinnacle dives.

SEAFOOD CASSEROLE

1/2 lb scallops
1/2 lb fresh mushrooms, sliced
1/2 lb raw shrimp, peeled and
 deveined
1/4 cup butter

1/2 cup heavy cream
2 Tbs finely chopped chives
 or parsley
2 Tbs sherry or brandy
Salt, pepper and bread crumbs

Saute scallops, shrimp and mushrooms in butter until barely cooked. Put in a casserole with the juices and butter from the pan. Add cream, sherry or brandy, chives, salt and pepper. Sprinkle top with bread crumbs. Dot with more butter and put in a 350° oven for 20-25 minutes. Serves 4-6.

New members paying full annual membership allowed one single day dive at approximately half of member price. Dive 99-C11 does not include air, food, and beverages. All dives except 99-C11 are limited load of 28 divers.

Great Escape - 22nd Street Landing

South on Harbor freeway, left on Gaffey, left on 22nd Street, down the hill and park in designated areas.

Peace - Ventura Marina

North on Ventura freeway to Victoria Ave. in Ventura. Turn left onto Victoria and continue to Olivas Park Drive. Turn right and continue all the way down toward the beach and across Harbor Drive, go to the left onto Spinnaker Drive. Look for Milano's Italian Restaurant and turn right into the parking area. If you get to the end of Spinnaker, turn around and take the second left. Park adjacent to the berth (Slip #20) to unload, then park overnight in the last row adjacent to Spinnaker Drive.

DIVE BOAT POLICY

A club member may, but is not required to, have a boat deposit on file with the club. A club member may make a reservation on an upcoming dive as follows:

- A) Unconfirmed reservations may be made for any boat dive at any time. To confirm a reservation, payment in full must be received.
- B) For single day dives, divers holding an unconfirmed reservation will be called 3 weeks prior to the dive and advised that payment in full is required no later than 15 days prior to the dive to be confirmed. Dive boat deposits will be considered as payment in full.
- C) For two day dives, divers holding unconfirmed reservations will be called 5 weeks prior to the dive and advised that payment in full is required no later than 30 days prior to the dive to be confirmed. Dive boat deposits may be used as part of the payment in full.
- D) If payment in full is not received by the deadline, the diver may be replaced by a wait listed diver who has paid in full.

Any reservation may be cancelled two weeks prior to a dive with a full refund. Cancellations will not be accepted within two weeks prior to the dive unless a diver holding a reservation can sell or transfer their reservation to another qualified diver. The dive reservationist will assist in this process, but is not responsible for providing paying alternates. When confirmation is received by the dive boat reservationist that a cancelling diver is being replaced by another qualified diver, the replacement diver is then fully responsible for the cost of the dive.

If a diver has a deposit on file with the club and uses that deposit to secure a reservation on a boat dive, he may not use that deposit to secure additional dives until he has paid the club for the first dive. Two years after a diver has ceased to be a member of the club, his unclaimed dive boat deposit will be forfeited to the club. Only club members of The Sea Divers and members of other selected clubs may make boat dive reservations prior to one month before a scheduled boat dive. Partial refunds from single day boats which do not make the advertised dive location will be passed on to members who request them within two weeks of the dive.
